

# **Progressive Sanctification By Jerry Propst**

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Introduction: Anyone who is a counselor needs to be familiar with certain basic doctrines which directly affect the process by which we counsel. If we start with incorrect suppositions about God, man, and sin, we will not arrive at a truly biblical solution to the challenges our counselees are facing. A proper understanding of sanctification in particular is foundational to properly assessing the problem and then leading the counselee to a godly solution. Part of that understanding is getting a handle on what is meant by progressive sanctification. Counseling is an instrument God intends for us to use in cooperating with the Holy Spirit to help believers move toward a more complete holiness. It is an intensive ministry of discipleship.

-	To set apart for God's purposes and use e.g. – utensils to be used in the temple and the priests who serve there. e.g. – Paul and Barnabas –			
	Acts 13:2 - While they were worshiping the Lord and fasting, the Holy Spirit said, " for me Barnabas and Saul for the work to which I have called them."			
-	To take what is considered common and set it apart as holy e.g. — a common ordinary pot or kettle used in everyday life is not satisfactory for temple use without being properly cleansed and dedicated. Once it is so dedicated it must never be used for ordinary purposes again.			
-	To establish a person who was once a sinner as righteous  1 Thessalonians 4:7 - For God has not called us for impurity, but in holiness.			
	<b>2 Timothy 2:21-22</b> - Therefore, if anyone cleanses himself from what is dishonorable, he will be a vessel for honorable use, set apart as holy, useful to the master of the house, ready for every good work.

Justification is aevent occurring at conversion in which the believer is declared righteous by God because of Christ's substitutionary death on his behalf.  Hebrews 7:27 - He has no need, like those high priests, to offer sacrifices daily, first for his own sins and then for those of the people, since he did this once for all when he offered up himself.
	<b>Hebrews 10:18</b> - Where there is forgiveness of these (sins), there is no longer any offering for sin.

#### 6. Nature of Sanctification

### **Approach to Counseling**

- 1. Provide them with hope
- 2. Identify their problem
  - a. Their awareness of the truth
  - b. The level and nature of their sin
  - c. Their readiness to address the fundamental issue
  - d. Their willingness to cooperate with the Holy Spirit
- 3. Map a strategy for dealing with the counselee
- 4. Provide them with homework and an opportunity for accountability
- 5. Pray for them
- 6. Reassure them of your commitment to their success
