#### Meridian First Baptist Church We teach the Bible as if lives depended on it. Cool Bible Passages (that we sometimes overlook)

My recent Bible reading landed me in the book of Ezekiel. As a priest, God directed Ezekiel to write down an incredible vision as he sat along the Chabar River in Tel Abib. Ezekiel is thirty years old and has been exiled to this foreign land for five years. He is at the age that most priests would normally begin their formal ministry and God incredibly calls him into His service.

I have included the opening verses, but take notice of Ezekiel 18:1-24 and read it in its entirety. Here's some of my **observations**, **interpretation** and **application** of the text as I answer a few questions.

#### Ezekiel 18:1-4

The Soul Who Sins Shall Die [1] The word of the LORD came to me: [2] "What do you mean by repeating this proverb concerning the land of Israel, 'The fathers have eaten sour grapes, and the children's teeth are set on edge'? [3] As I live, declares the Lord GOD, this proverb shall no more be used by you in Israel. [4] Behold, all souls are mine; the soul of the father as well as the soul of the son is mine: the soul who sins shall die. (ESV)

#### What is the major theme of the text?

An individual's sin will affect others, and yet he is responsible for his own sin and therefore must repent so he can experience life with God.

## What are the repeated words in the text (a clue to the theme or subject)?

Three times the statement-"*declares the Lord God*" is affirmation that this message is directly from God. Within several scenarios, we see some conditions represented by the use of the word *if*. Then, clearly it is God who delineates and determines the judgment upon the *righteous* (2 times) and the unrighteous/ wicked (3 times). There are more contrasts as we stack up *sin* and *iniquity*, which combine for 11 counts in the *wicked* column. The message is one that concerns the *soul*, which is used 5 times. As a type of *inclusio*, we are captured by the strong statement "the soul that sins shall die" (vss. 4, 20).

# What are the universal truths that would be applicable to both the original and present day readers?

There are several applicable universal truths. <u>First</u>, God judges, "the soul that sins shall die" (vss. 4,20), so we should fear God. <u>Second</u>, as God does not enjoy killing the wicked (vs. 25), we can express gratitude for his mercy and grace. <u>Third</u>, righteous people are characterized by righteous acts and experience life with God, so we can also pursue righteousness. <u>Fourth</u>, the wicked are characterized by sin and will die, so we must avoid sin. <u>Finally</u>, the wicked also have opportunity to repent and live with God, so we also can repent when we have acted wickedly.

# In what ways do you see this text speaking to the progressive sanctification of the believer today?

From our text, we learn that righteous actions characterize the righteous person. The righteous people do not participate in some things (*wickedness* in general) but do actively forge righteous acts into their lifestyles. Ezekiel composes contrasting lists of the things that righteous people do and do not do. These lists have numerous complements to the believer today who actively pursues righteousness. The text's description of the righteous who "walks in My statutes and keeps My rules by acting faithfully" (vs. 17) illustrates <u>progressive sanctification</u>. A parallel is found in Philippians 2:12-14 and highlighted with "work out your own salvation with fear and trembling".

How will you "work out your own salvation" this week? Begin by opening up your Bible and "making your ear attentive to wisdom and inclining your heart to understanding" (Prov.2:2).
