A. Their Gross Display (vs. 38-40b)

"In His teaching He was saying: 'Beware of the scribes, who like to walk around in long robes and like respectful greetings in the market places and chief seats in the synagogues and places of honor at banquets...and for appearance's sake offer long prayers"

## II. THE HUMILITY OF THE WIDOW COMMENDED (vs. 41-44)

A. The Poor Examples Before Her (vs. 41)

"And He sat down opposite the treasury, and began observing how the people were putting money into the treasury; and many rich people were putting in large sums."

- 1) He sees the ones who give.
- 2) He sees why they give.

3) He sees how much they don't give.

B. The Good Example She Gave Us (vs. 42)

"A poor widow came and put in two small copper coins, which amount to a cent."

C. The Lessons Jesus Applied from Her Example (vs. 43-44)

"Calling His disciples to Him, He said to them, 'Truly I say to you, this poor widow put in more than all the contributors to the treasury; for they all put in out of their surplus, but she, out of her poverty, put in all she owned, all she had to live on.' "
