He said to Him, "Yes, Lord; You know [oidas] that I love [philo] You." He said to him, "Tend My lambs." ¹⁶ He said to him again a second time, "Simon, son of John, do you love [agapas] Me?" He said to Him, "Yes, Lord; You know [oidas] that I love [philo] You." He said to him, "Shepherd My sheep." ¹⁷ He said to him the third time, "Simon, son of John, do you love [phileis] Me?" Peter was grieved because He said to him the third time, "Do you love [phileis] Me?" And he said to Him, "Lord, You know [*oidas*] all things; You know [ginoskeis] that I love [philo] You." Jesus said to him, "Tend My sheep."

C. Peter comes back strong.

For you to hear the Lord's voice...

- 1) you must be in a place where He can speak to you
- 2) you must be ready to listen to what He says
- 3) you must be prepared to hear some hard things
- 4) you must be willing to make changes
- 5) you must keep your eyes fixed on Jesus alone

Conclusion:

- 1) Take care how you respond to spiritual battle when you are tired physically.
- 2) When facing a trial, think ahead and prepare your answers. Beyond that, trust the Holy Spirit to lead you in your answers.
- 3) To do that, you need to be walking in the Spirit. This comes through daily reading of Scripture so that you grow in the mind of Christ thinking God's thoughts after Him.
- The guiding light in this process (that you will bring you safely into the harbor) is the Lord Jesus Christ. Keep your eyes on Him.
