Introduction

"Next week, gas prices will..."

"Now it came about in the days when the judges governed, that there was a famine in the land. And a certain man of Bethlehem in Judah..."

The Trilogy of Bethlehem

Judges 17–18: religious degradation, spiritual apostasy

Judges 19–21: moral depravity

Ruth 1–4: redemption in/of Bethlehem

In **Ruth 1:1-5**, we will see 2 painful consequences that befell God's people when they forgot Him.

- 1. Infidelity Resulted in Instability (1–2)
- 2. Indifference Resulted in Infertility (3–5)

1) INFIDELITY RESULTED IN INSTABILITY (1–2)

[VERSE 1a]

"in the days when the judges governed": 1375–1075 BC

"there was a famine in the land".

previous famines: Genenesis 12:10; 26:1; 41:54

promises of famine: Leviticus 26:19–20; Deuteronomy 28:38–40

[VERSE 1b]

"And a certain man of Bethlehem in Judah went to sojourn":

"in the land of Moab": Deuteronomy 28:64-65

Ruth 1:1–5 4/14/2024

[VERSE 2]

"Elimelech": my God is king // "in those days there was no king in Israel"

2) Indifference Resulted in Infertility (3–5)

[VERSE 3]

"Naomi's husband died"

[VERSE 4]

"They took for themselves Moabite women as wives": Deut 7:3-4

Origin of the Moabites: Genesis 19:30–38

Idolatry of the Moabites: Numbers 21:29; 2 Kings 3:26–27; 23:10, 13

Moabites and Israelites: Numbers 25:1–3; Deuteronomy 23:3–6

"They took":

Forced marriage (Judges 21:23)

Polygamous marriage (2 Chronicles 11:21)

Mixed marriage (Ezra 9:2)

[VERSE 5]

"the woman was bereft of her two children and her husband": Deuteronomy 28:18

Hope of a remnant: "left" (v. 3) = "bereft/left without" (v. 5)
